Hamilton Middle School Wins National African American History Challenge Bowl

Hamilton Middle School, winner of the April African American History Challenge Bowl (AAHCB) sponsored by 100 Black Men of Madison, Inc., was crowned **National Champion** after competing and emerging victorious at the 26th Annual 100 Black Men of America National Conference in Atlanta, Georgia, 13-17 June 2012. Awards included savings bonds, scholarships and the National Trophy that will be in the possession of Hamilton Middle School until the 2013 competition.



Hamilton Middle School initially competed in the 18th Annual AAHCB Saturday, 14 April 2012, at the Doyle Administration Building of the Madison Metropolitan School District. This educational program is designed to enhance the study of African-American history. The Challenge Bowl was open to all Madison-area students with the goal to encourage pride, self-worth and an appreciation of the African-American legacy and culture. It is a challenging and fun way for students to expand their knowledge of African-American history in highly competitive local and national competitions.

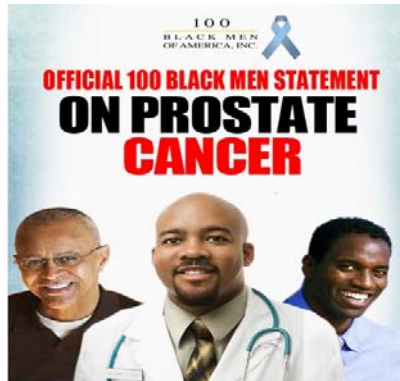

Official 100 Black Men Statement on Prostate Cancer

"The 100 Black Men of America, Inc. is deeply disappointed that the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force failed to amend its draft recommendation on Prostate Cancer," stated Albert E. Dotson, Jr., Chairman, 100 Black Men of America, Inc. "The final recommendation, issued in May 2012, did not reflect the benefits of the prostate specific antigen (PSA) test in the detection of Prostate Cancer for men at highest risk of having Prostate Cancer."



African American men are 2 1/2 times more likely to die from Prostate Cancer than white men. Prostate Cancer accounts for more than 40% of diagnosed cancers among African American men and African American men have 60% higher incidence of Prostate Cancer than white men. In short, African American men get it earlier, get it more often, suffer graver symptoms and die more frequently from Prostate Cancer than their white male counterparts.
